(Monday am) IAIN GUEST is the Executive Director of The Advocacy Project. Iain has been a reporter (Geneva-based correspondent for the London-based Guardian and International Herald Tribune); an author; a television anchorman (BBC); and a UN spokesperson Cambodia (1992) and Haiti (2004). He is currently an adjunct professor at Georgetown's School of Foreign Service, where he teaches human rights.
